



About South East England


The beautiful South East England is the gateway to England on Europe's doorstep – discover amazing history, stunning landscapes and the great outdoors.

TRAVEL TO SOUTH EAST ENGLAND

By Ferry to Dover, Newhaven or Portsmouth.

By Train with Eurostar to Paddington and various connections across the South East.

By Car with Eurotunnel to Folkestone.

By Plane to Gatwick, Heathrow or Southampton.













Start your trip in **1066 Country** (www.visit1066country.com). Set deep in history, where the Sussex Weald meets the sea, lie the ancient settlements and rich landscapes of 1066 Country. Open skies and broad horizons inspire the imagination. 1066 Country is home to some of Sussex's finest coast and countryside including the famous historic site on which the Battle of Hastings was fought. It encompasses 30 miles of coast, 22 Festivals, 15 musuems, 4 galleries and 6 castles! Discover the unique towns and villages of Battle, Bexhill, Bodiam, Camber, Hastings, Herstmonceux, Pevensey, Rye and Winchelsea.

Where To Stay

Flackley Ash Hotel,

Peasmarsh - A cosy country house hotel, set in 5 acres just outside Rye. 44 rooms, including garden suites and four poster rooms, a la carte



restaurant and small indoor swimming pool and spa facilities.

The Gallivant, Camber - A boutique hotel across the road from the sand dunes and beautiful beach of Camber Sands. Good restaurant serving local produce. Yoga and Wellness.



<u>Wickham Manor</u>, Winchelsea - A National Trust-owned 16th Century Manor House nestled within the 750-acre mixed farm and the Charles Palmer vineyard. Accommodation is in two self-contained areas of the house.

What To Do:

<u>Discovery Centre</u> at <u>Rye Harbour Nature Reserve</u> – An important wildlife site set in an exceptional coastal and wetland landscape. Home to more than 4,355 species of plants and animals.

Wine tasting and tour of <u>Charles Palmer Vineyard</u> at Winchelsea - an ideal climate for vines; proximity to the sea, south facing slope and its terroir.

Tour <u>Winchelsea</u>. Once one of England's most thriving ports, now landlocked, it was planned as a medieval new town, set on a hill and constructed with hidden vaults beneath. Book a <u>Cellar Tour</u>.

Rye Heritage Centre – Housed in a converted 19th century sail loft, it includes the Rye Town Model 'Story of Rye' Sound and Light Show, a vintage, hand built 1:100 scale model of Victorian Rye.

<u>Discover Rye</u> - A medieval citadel huddled against invaders and the sea. It's home to a myriad of art, curiosities, cosy pubs, as well as modern boutique hotels, contemporary restaurants and Rye Castle Museum (Ypres Tower). Book a guided walking tour.

<u>Lamb House</u> (National Trust) – the former home of author, Henry James.

DAY THREE IN EASTBOURNE













Stroll along three miles of pristine palm-lined promenade in **Eastbourne**, take in a show at the elegant art-deco inspired Bandstand, admire the views from the iconic Victorian Pier or simply admire the breath-taking beauty of the coastal landmarks at Beachy Head and along the Heritage Coastline to the world-famous Seven Sisters. Follow the many walking routes to take in some of the panoramic views from the highest chalk cliffs in the UK! Eastbourne is the perfect seaside escape. Art and culture seekers can take in a show at one of Eastbourne's theatres, or admire the collections at the award-winning Towner Gallery.

Where to Stay & Eat

The Grand Hotel -

"England's finest resort hotel"- as described by the RAC. 152 bedrooms and suites, two restaurants and luxurious lounges. Facilities: health club, hair and beauty salon.

<u>The View Hotel</u> - Situated on the seafront with stunning panoramic views to all air conditioned public rooms. Many bedrooms have furnished balconies. Less than



5 minutes walk from the Congress theatre and the Winter Garden.

<u>Bistrot Pierre</u> - Enjoy stunning panoramic sea views, overlooking Beachy Head whilst enjoying a relaxing dining experience at Bistrot Pierre.

Things to Do

Towner Art Gallery (host of the 2023 Turner Prize)Collecting and exhibiting contemporary art for nearly 100
years, it presents a programme of historic, modern and
contemporary art. Best known for its modern British art,
including the largest and most significant body of work by
Eric Ravilious (1903–1942), and a growing collection of
international contemporary art including works by Dineo
Seshee Bopape, John Akomfrah, and Wolfgang Tillmans.
Beachy Head Story - The dramatic 530 feet high cliffs of
Beachy Head give stunning views over Eastbourne and
the English Channel. Walk from the foot of Beachy Head
or climb to the top for dramatic views of the famous red
and white-stripped lighthouse. The exhibition will explain
the ever changing nature of the headland in both use and
appearance

Seven Sisters Country Park - Found at the point where the South Downs meets the sea, the Sisters were created when ancient rivers cut valleys into the chalk, creating seven peaks. Haven Brow, the highest of them at 253 feet (77 metres), stands majestically to the west of her other sisters. Now part of the Heritage Coast, an 'Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty' and also a 'Site of Special Scientific Interest'.











Start your visit to Portsmouth (www.visitportsmouth.co.uk) on a high at the Spinnaker Tower then enjoy a maritime themed visit to Portsmouth Historic Dockyard to discover centuries of history - including Henry VIII's Mary Rose, Nelson's HMS Victory, HMS Warrior, boat trips around the harbour plus lots more. Visit The D-Day Story, now including a visit on board the massive landing craft LCT7074. Nearby Henry VIII's Southsea Castle offers free visits (Apr- Oct). For those who like a spot of shopping, stop off at Gunwharf Quays.

Where to Stay & Eat

Royal Maritime Hotel & Club Established in 1850, it gained 'Royal patronage' in 1855, after Prince
 Albert visited the hotel. Queen
 Victoria became patron. Royal visits include Queen Elizabeth II and King Charles III (patron since 2007).



Membership is open to all serving and retired members of the Armed Forces and their families as well as those of the Royal Navy, Royal Marines and Merchant Navy. It has 90 comfortable bedrooms, a restaurant, café, bars and leisure facilities: swimming pool, spa pool, sauna, skittles alley and billiards room.

<u>Ibis</u> - In a prime location in the centre of Portsmouth close to popular annual events including Goodwood Festival of Speed, and Victorious music festival.
 144 rooms are an ode to the



naval history of Portsmouth, with porthole-shaped windows.

<u>Abarbistro</u> – <u>Family-run bistro & bar situated in the heart of Old Portsmouth. Back in 1784 there was a pub on the site called the Shipwrights Arms. By 1887,
</u>

it was known as the American Hotel, legend has it, that it used to house convicts waiting to be deported to penal colonies in Virginia during the 18th century.



Things To Do

- The Mary Rose 2022 marks 40 years since the Mary Rose, Henry VIII's favourite ship, was raised from the sea bed. Now on view in world-class museum within the Dockyard
- Portsmouth Historic Dockyard Historic ships, include Vice-Admiral Lord Nelson's flagship HMS Victory, Queen Victoria's HMS Warrior and the only surviving ship from the First World War's Gallipoli campaign, HMS M.33. Take the complimentary waterbus to Gosport and explore Cold War submarine HMS Alliance.
- Spinnaker Tower stands at 170 metres tall, offering breath-taking 23 mile views over the city, Portsmouth Harbour, the Solent and the Isle of Wight. It has a high speed lift and 3 sky-high viewing decks. The thrilling glass 'Sky Walk' is 100m above sea level.
- The D-Day Story Following a £5 million transformation project (Heritage Lottery Fund) - the museum provides an engaging insight into the lives of those who took part in D-Day; individuals on the shore in Portsmouth, or those who went over to Normandy. Take a guided tour of the massive landing craft LCT7074. Audio guides to the museum itself available in French and German as well as English.
- Southsea Castle Built in 1544, it was part of a series of fortifications constructed by Henry VIII around England's coasts to protect from invaders.
- Gunwharf Quays home to over 95 premium retail outlet stores offering famous brand names at discount prices.













Stay in Portsmouth for an extra night and take a leisurely drive to Poole (just over an hour's drive). Enjoy a cruise in the morning to Swanage and combine with a steam train to Corfe Castle. The ruins of Corfe Castle are perched on a hill overlooking the village with the same name.

Discover a different view of The Jurassic Coast with City Cruises. The Jurassic Coast is a 95-mile long stretch of coastline in southern England, situated within the counties of Dorset and Devon. It is a UNESCO World Heritage Site recognised for its outstanding rocks, fossils and landforms.

Operating the largest fleet of sightseeing boats in Poole Quay, City Cruises operates a regular, daily service along The Jurassic Coast towards Swanage from 1st April to 31st October. Take in 185 million years of geological history whilst listening to the Captain's live commentary.

Sightseeing Tours

- **Jurassic Coast Tour** 2hrs 15mins cruise. Take in the fantastic views of The UNESCO Jurassic Coast Line and cliff chalk formations.
- The Harbour & Island Cruise 70 minute boat trip around Europe's largest natural harbour.
- **Poole to Swanage Coastal Cruise** passing Brownsea Island and the opening cliffs of the Jurassic coast. Enjoy time ashore. Take a steam train to Corfe Castle.

• **Fish & Chips Cruise** – Either join one of our summer evening fish and chip cruises or as an add-on to a day's sightseeing cruise. Available any time throughout the year!













For visitors, a tour of Windsor Castle is a must-see of course, but there are many other attractions for groups and individuals to enjoy within the **Royal Borough of Windsor and Maidenhead**.

Take a sightseeing cruise on the River Thames with **French Brothers**, offering a relaxing time afloat. A short drive across Windsor Great Park, enjoy a tour of the beautiful **Savill Garden**, managed by the Crown Estate. Further along the river lie the hidden gems of **Maidenhead Heritage Centre**, where you can fly the Spitfire Simulator and **The Stanley Spencer Gallery** with exhibitions of the great 20th century British artist. For evenings, the **Theatre Royal Windsor** has a full calendar of plays or the historic Old Courts Arts Centre. There's **Dr Chocs**, chocolate Factory where you can make your own bon bons or **Windsor & Eton Brewery** where you can tour and sample the ales. Queen Elizabeth II was renowned for her love of horse racing, training and racing her own thoroughbreds. Include a race meeting at **Ascot Racecourse** or at **Royal Windsor Racecourse**. **Windsor Tourist Guides** walking tours cross the picturesque bridge from Windsor to Eton and **Tootbus's** hop-on hop-off bus tours, take in charming Datchet and the **Royal Farm Shop** in Old Windsor. And for families there's **Legoland**.

Where to Stay

Fairmont Windsor Park -

A beautiful hotel set in the English countryside where history and iconic elegance merge to create an outstanding destination.



Located opposite Windsor Castle and Windsor Guildhall. Steeped in history, with regal connections and sightseeing opportunities on its doorstep.

Macdonald Windsor Hotel -

Contemporary townhouse situated just two minutes' walk from Windsor Castle.

The Royal Adelaide Hotel – A boutique hotel just off the famous Long Walk. A stunning Georgian building.









Things to Do

<u>Ascot Racecourse</u> – One of the world's most famous and best-loved racecourses.

<u>Dr Choc's Windsor Chocolate Factory</u> – Chocolate workshops, café and shop.

<u>French Brothers Boats</u> – From Windsor incl. 40 minute round trips, from Maidenhead and historic Runnymede.

Maidenhead Heritage Centre.

<u>Legoland Windsor Resort</u> – Theme Park, on-site hotels. <u>The Old Court (Artspace)</u> – Vibrant arts centre.

<u>The Savill Garden</u> – One of the country's finest woodland gardens, located in Windsor Great Park.

<u>The Stanley Spencer Gallery</u> – Art Gallery in Cookham dedicated to Stanley Spencer's works.

<u>Theatre Royal Windsor</u> – Grade II listed local theatre, providing a mix of theatrical, live music and comedy. <u>Tootbus</u> – Climb aboard at any of the stops and explore Windsor and Eton, separated by the Thames.

<u>Windsor Castle</u> – An official residence of King Charles III and the oldest inhabited castle in the world.

<u>Windsor & Eton Brewery</u> – Local craft brewery with tours. <u>Royal Windsor Racecourse</u> – Race days and events. <u>Windsor Royal Station</u> – Dining and shopping set in the old royal station.











On the way to Maidstone, break your journey at <u>Devil's Punchbowl, Hindhead</u> (National Trust). Take a short walk and cup of tea This serene heathland with farreaching views is home to myths, legends and dark tales of highway men. Sir Arthur Conan Doyle, author of Sherlock Holmes, used to walk the Commons and it's said that he used Hindhead as the inspiration for the book 'The Hound of the Baskervilles'.



<u>Maidstone</u> in the heart of the Kent countryside has some wonderful events each year, both at the Kent County Show Ground and at many other venues in the town including the theatre, the museum and Leeds Castle. The town is just 39 miles from Central London and is an ideal base for exploring the county of Kent. The River Medway running through the heart of the town provides a great place to walk, cycle and enjoy a number of independent cafes and riverside views.

Where to Stay

Mercure Maidstone Great

Danes - Set in 26 acres of
glorious countryside
adjoining the famous Leeds
Castle. Enjoy tennis, golf,
the health club, gym or



swimming pool in one of the finest spa hotels Kent offers. <u>Tudor Park Marriott Hotel & Golf Club</u> - Surrounded by 200 acres of ancestral deer parkland, the hotel offers a wide range of great amenities and comfortable rooms perfect for a relaxing stay.

Orida Maidstone Hotel - Located off the M20, less than 10 minutes from central Maidstone. With 146 spacious bedrooms, quality restaurant, lounge bar, Starbucks cafe and ORIDA Health featuring an indoor pool, whirlpool, sauna, spa and gym.

Things to Do

The Maidstone Distillery - Situated in the historic market buildings of Maidstone town centre, the beautiful still and equipment sit at the heart of the distillery, nestled beneath grand arches dating back to the 1800's. Enjoy a double George Bishop gin and tonic at the bar before being guided to the experience room to start the tour. Delve into the fascinating story of distilling right here that spans over 200 years, and demonstrate the processes used to create the fine hand crafted spirits today. You'll see the beautiful still and equipment up close, before you're back at the bar for a tutored tasting of the spirits and hear about the inspiration behind them.

Leeds Castle - Set in 500 acres of Kentish parkland, it has been a Norman stronghold; the private property of six of England's medieval queens; a palace used by Henry VIII and his first wife Catherine of Aragon; a Jacobean country house; a Georgian mansion; an elegant early 20th century retreat for the influential and famous. The Castle's last private owner, Lady Baillie, bought the Castle in 1926 and transformed it into an elegant setting for glorious weekend parties. Sir Winston Churchill, Charlie Chaplin and John F. Kennedy are amongst the roll-call of many other influential guests who enjoyed Lady Baillie's hospitality during this time.



DAY EIGHT WHITE CLIFFS COUNTRY

Where to Stay & Eat

Overnight at the Bell Hotel, Sandwich - A grand Edwardian Hotel, brimming with character with a chic, modern magic. Set in a



beautiful spot overlooking the River Stour. Recently refurbished, There's a vibrant bar and dining area with an alfresco terrace,

George and Dragon - A restaurant and pub in the medieval cinque port town of Sandwich in Kent. The inn was originally built in the 24th year of the 1st reign of Henry VI, in 1446.

The Drill Hall Restaurant, Bar & Gelateria - Erected in 1869. It was the HQ of a Territorial Army detachment of The Buffs Regiment (5 Bn. The Buffs, TA Royal East Kent Regiment), now The Princess of Wales Regiment.

The Coastguard, St Margaret's Bay - A historic sea-side published restaurant it has kept watch on the sea-front for

The Coastguard, St Margaret's Bay - A historic sea-side pub and restaurant it has kept watch on the sea-front for more than 300 years. Take a walk on the beach to see where lan Fleming lived.

Things To Do

Historic Tour of Sandwich with <u>Sandwich Local History</u> <u>Society</u> including visit to the <u>Guildhall and Museum</u>. <u>River Runner</u> - Cruise to see the seals with River Runner hosted by Paul Cannon and Wayne

Take in a film at the <u>Art Deco Cinema</u> - On 26th June, 1937 the Empire Cinema in Sandwich opened its doors for the first time. It re-opened in 1993, and has still retained the art deco architecture

Walmer Castle and Gardens - Explore over eight acres of award-winning gardens in the grounds of a Tudor fortress turned country house. Built on the orders of Henry VIII to defend England's southern shores, Walmer Castle later became a home for the Lords Warden of the Cinque Ports — among them the Duke of Wellington and the Queen Mother.

Samphire Hoe - Samphire Hoe is an amazing place. There is something for everyone who enjoys the outdoors and wildlife: a stunning location and outstanding scenery, peace and quiet, walks, wildflowers, birds and picnics. And the further you go from the car park, the wilder the site becomes.
